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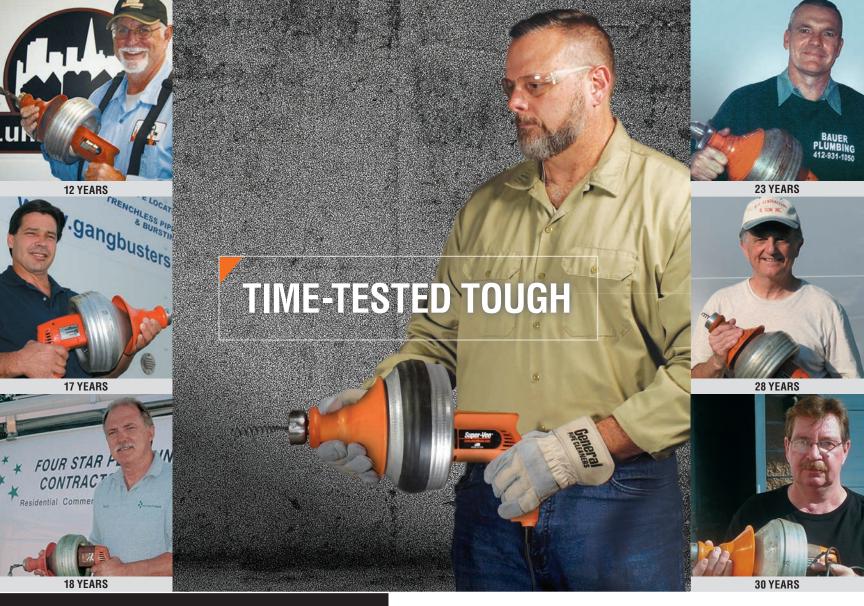

A one-man show has different challenges than a big company, but the goals remain the same

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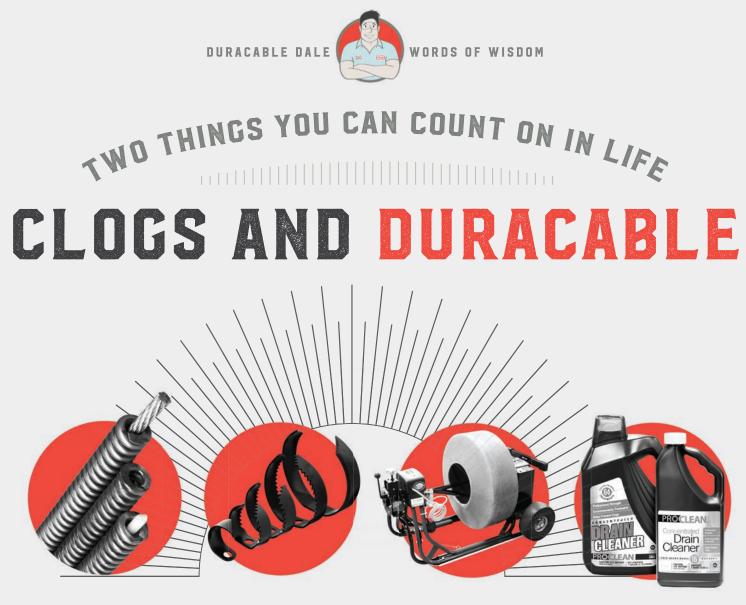
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EVENTS OF TAKES A TACTICAL HIGH-TECH

FLORIDA CONTRACTOR TAKES A TACTICAL, HIGH-TECH APPROACH TO TRENCHLESS PIPELINE REHAB

ngineered Lining Systems prides itself on taking a decidedly technology-centric approach to trenchless pipeline rehabilitation. And few things epitomize that philosophy more than the company's nearly \$1 million investment in a German-made pipe lining system.

Developed by IBG HydroTech, the system is designed to line pipes from 6 to 72 inches in diameter. It uses a computercontrolled curing process that uses a UV light "train" that can cure up to 7 feet of glass-reinforced plastic liners per minute.

"It's the most powerful curing truck in the United States right now. It's a very complex system," says Don Arch, owner and president of the Jacksonville-based company. "And the return on investment so far has been tenfold."

The investment in the IBG system reflects a key strategy that has contributed greatly to the company's growth to \$6 million yearly revenue: Be the first to invest in advanced, productivity- and profitabilityenhancing equipment and technologies.

That's an expensive philosophy in terms of upfront costs. But on the other hand, a six- or seven-figure price tag also creates a high barrier to market entry by competitors, Arch says.

"We pride ourselves on being first to market with new technology. It keeps competitors at bay who don't want to or can't afford to make those kinds of investments.

"In fact, we end up doing a fair amount of UV-curing for other companies because they also realize it's the best technology for their customer, but they just can't pull the trigger on such a significant investment."

A STRATEGIC NICHE

Since the company's inception in 2004, Engineered Lining Systems has also embraced another strategy, similar to the old hit-itwhere-they-ain't baseball philosophy: Develop a base of clients that require more specialized and technical trenchless solutions that other companies aren't interested in tackling.

As such, the company serves a wide range of customers in somewhat niche markets, including nuclear power plants, power utilities, airports, military bases and hospitals, Arch says.

"We try to go into areas where there's not a lot of competition. We pride ourselves on doing projects that require a lot of logistics and working with companies that require a great safety record.

"Instead of going after competitive, low-bid projects, we try to focus on negotiated projects for customers that are looking for a good, long-term solution, not just putting a Band-Aid on a repair.

"We also have a reputation for looking at projects, breaking them down with methodical analyses and making sure all stakeholders understand the risks involved," he adds. "We're good at looking at all the hurdles involved and coming up with well-researched solutions, which requires us to constantly keep a finger on the pulse of new technologies."

After completing projects, ELS also strives to maintain business relationships via multiyear service agreements that emphasize long-term repairs and maintenance as opposed to random, one-off and very expensive emergency calls.

"Helping clients understand the cost of downtime from a piping failure is a conscious business model that we work under," Arch

says. Showing clients where they need to focus, say, five years down the road helps them develop budgets proactively rather than reacting to expensive surprises.

"Customers really do appreciate it. Progressive companies look at money spent as money saved and that's the kind of customers we want."

LINERS FOR EVERYTHING

That approach also inspired the company's name. "We wanted something that would tell the customer we're not just showing up with an old pickup truck, throwing a liner in the ground and hoping for the best," he says.

"And I say 'we,' I mean everyone. It's a total team effort here. We've attracted world-class project managers and crews that have pushed the company to the next level. We get a lot of comments from customers about how knowledgeable our people are. To me, that means everything."

The company also does pipe lining work for industrial and municipal clients as well as state departments of transportation. Its crews have lined sewers, culverts, electrical conduits and processpipe systems.

One project involved lining a vacuum tube at a veteran's hospital that's used to send nuclear medicine from a lab to an operating room about half a mile away, like the tubes used at bank drive-through stations, Arch says. 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PROGRESSIVE CHOICES

After graduating from high school, Arch spent about 20 years in the plumbing and mechanical arena before establishing ELS with a business partner who's no longer with the company. He opted to get into trenchless technology because it seemed like a much better solution to common problems plumbers face — particularly leaking water pipes in concrete slabs, which are quite common in Florida.

The company's first investment was an epoxy lining system for smallerdiameter pipes. The company then expanded into work on military bases scattered throughout the area, he says.

"That's where we really started to cut our teeth on lining large-diameter pipes."

A pivotal moment occurred while Arch attended a Pumper & Cleaner Environmental Expo International trade show (now called the Water & Wastewater Equipment, Treatment & Transport Show) in 2008, where he ran across emerging pipe lining technology from Europe.

"We decided we wanted to be ahead of the curve — be progressive about how we put these projects together," he says. "UV-cured pipe lining was definitely a step in the right direction.

"You get better quality control and with military and airfield clients, that was very important — they like documented quality control. So we started making investments in equipment and it's paid off very well for us."

HIGH-TECH EQUIPMENT INVESTMENTS

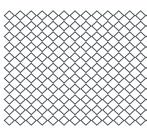
ELS has also invested in other UV-cured lining systems. It owns a Prokasro Services USA system, housed in a 2006 International 4300 D truck with a 30-foot-long box body made by Supreme Corp. It can line pipes from 6 to 48 inches in diameter at speeds up to 5 feet per minute.

The company uses liners made by Omega Liner, SAERTEX multiCOM, iMPREG and APEX CIPP Solutions.

For cleaning pipelines, the company has invested in a GapVax combination

THE QUICK UV CURE

n 2019, a 480-foot long, 42-inch-diameter culvert that runs under a runway at a Florida airport needed repairs. But airport officials were concerned about the cost and major disruption of shutting down a major runway.

Engineered Lining Services (ELS) in Jacksonville provided a solution: Line the culvert with a UV-lightcured, glass-reinforced plastic liner.

The total cure time for the liner was just two hours and the total project time was about 14 hours — a vivid demonstration of the benefits of trenchless pipeline rehab technology.

"And flights were coming in as we worked," says Don Arch, owner and president of ELS.

To do the job, the company relied on a nearly \$1 million pipe lining system manufactured by Germanybased IBG HydroTech. The system can line pipes from 6 to 72 inches in diameter and utilizes a computercontrolled process that can cure liners up to 7 feet per minute via a light train outfitted with 400- to 1,500watt bulbs.

The system is housed inside a 40-foot-long box body, made by Ohnsorg Truck Bodies, mounted on a 2018 Peterbilt 567 truck. Its sophisticated computers constantly monitor factors such as air pressure within the liner, curing speeds, air temperature inside the liner, the wattage outputs from the bulbs and so forth, Arch says.

One advantage with UV-curing is that crews can see inside the liner and spot abnormalities and imperfections before the curing process starts, courtesy of two cameras mounted on the light train. After the liner is inflated with a Gardner Denver blower system (600 cfm), technicians send the light train through with its lights off.

When technicians are sure the liner is properly positioned, with no wrinkles or other abnormalities or deformities, the light train passes through again, this time with its lights on. A computer controls its speed, based on factors such as the liner's diameter and thickness.

"It's the next leap forward in trenchless technology," Arch says. "When people see it, they're sold on it."

The faster curing speed is a game-changer, too, in terms of productivity and profitability.

sewer vacuum truck, featuring a 2009 Sterling chassis, a 10-cubic-yard debris tanks, an Ingersoll Rand blower (5,000 cfm), an 80 gpm, 3,500 psi water pump and a 3,500-gallon water tank.

The company's roster of equipment also includes a 2009 Chevrolet C5500 camera truck, outfitted by CUES with Ultra Shorty III and Steerable Pipe Ranger II pipeline inspection cameras; a Kubota RTV-X1100C all-terrain vehicle equipped by CUES with a digital universal camera; a 12-ton winch made by Hammerhead Trenchless; and Nozz-Teq Lumberjack root-cutting nozzles.

In the company's plumbing and mechanical division, technicians rely on a SpeedyLight+ UV curing system. Made by SEWERTRONICS for 3- to 8-inch diameter pipe, it's better at navigating lines with multiple bends. Other equipment includes Mini Miller and Maxi Miller drain cleaning/descaling and lateral-reinstatement machines from Picote Solutions; two CUES MPLUS+ push cameras for pipeline inspections; and a Picote Brush-Coating System for sealing pipes.

FOCUS ON TRAINING

ELS also invests heavily in training, for both trenchless technologies and on-the-job safety, with the latter coordinated by an in-house safety director. Product manufacturers supply some of the equipment training, while other portions are handled in-house, Arch says.

Like so many others that need skilled labor, the company finds it difficult to find enough qualified employees. To remedy that, Arch is working with a handful of manufacturers to develop an internal apprenticeship program for pipe lining and other technologies, similar to the apprenticeship program he followed to become a plumber.

"I feel an apprenticeship still is the best way to learn and get hands-on training and mentoring," he says. "We want to get new talent and grow, but there's not a large pool of trained people. So I think we need to do it on our own. A very high caliber of training is critical to our success."

Moreover, ongoing training helps to keep employees inspired and motivated. Advanced technology that relies on robotics and sophisticated computer programs — think robotic pipeline cameras and GIS mapping software, for example — also plays a role in attracting and retaining younger employees, Arch points out.

"They look at it as a big video game," he says. "It's kind of the world they grew up in — they're just naturals at it."

As an example, Arch cites a cloud-based GIS mapping system called Unearth. Among other features, it allows technicians to upload pipeline inspection videos to a platform where clients can watch as mapping progresses. The technology gives clients access to collected data in real time, as opposed to weeks if using conventional technology, and clients can communicate with office personnel and fields crews as the system collects data.

"It's this kind of responsiveness to customers and their needs — giving them information in a timely manner so they can make decisions in a timely manner — that helps us make a name for ourselves," Arch says. "It's another example of how we utilize technology to keep us moving forward."

MANAGING GROWTH

As Arch looks back, he says he never could've imagined not only how fast the company has grown, but where his career has taken him. The company has worked on projects under the U.S. Capitol and the White House, as well as in Trinidad, the Bahamas, Panama and Colombia. He's also taken business trips to Sweden and Germany.

"This career has taken me, a plumber, to areas of the world I never would've imagined possible — pretty much all over the world," he says. "We're just a little company in Jacksonville, but we're known around the world for the work we do."



Even after more than 15 years in the trenchless technology sector, he still feels as passionate as ever.

"It may sound weird, but it still gives me goose bumps when I talk to people about it," he says. "I love talking about it and I love doing what I do. I wake up every morning excited about the challenges ahead.

"And I love to see our employees keep improving themselves, too. It makes me feel like we're making a difference in the world."

As for what lies ahead, Arch says he anticipates intelligent, managed growth. If companies don't plan correctly and don't run projects properly, things can go sideways quickly, which usually is expensive, he notes.

"That's why we want controlled, managed growth. Eventually, we'd like to leapfrog over into certain areas like Atlanta and maybe some satellite office out West.

"But for now, we're focusing on refining procedures and processes before we take the next step. We want a plan in place, not just go somewhere and open an office and hope for the best." **c**

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GRIP IT AND RIP IT

Root removal is never easy, but drain cleaning equipment and a jetter will help you get the job done // By Anthony Pacilla

LEANING A RESIDENTIAL SEWER LINE WITH ROOTS can be a challenge. If you have traditional drain cleaning equipment and a jetter you have many advantages over companies who only have one or the other.

DEALING WITH CUSTOMERS

There is a process to follow when dealing with a homeowner regarding roots. Odds are that you've already charged them to open the drain and run a camera down the line. Convincing a homeowner to tack on extra charges on top of that can be difficult. Showing the customer the extent of the root intrusions is a big help — seeing is believing.

It is tough to give an accurate answer as to how long it may take to get the roots out. It is also difficult to explain that the roots might not all be removed, and they will most definitely grow back at some point (on an unknown time scale).

Give the customer options and let them choose; you are not in control of their family bank account. Giving a thorough explanation of the root cutting process is of the utmost importance.

REGARDLESS OF THE EQUIPMENT YOU HAVE, THE FIRST STEP IS TO PUNCH A HOLE IN THE ROOTS SO THAT THE DRAIN WILL TAKE WATER.

WHEN TO DIG AND WHEN TO CUT

Effectively cutting roots starts with identifying what kind of roots you are dealing with. You don't need to be an arborist and know exact root strengths, but you should be able to get a good idea of what you're dealing with by looking at the sewer camera images. You're not only looking for how thick they are but how long they've been growing in there.

Some of the hardest roots to get through are the thin fibrous root systems that have been growing for a long time. It's like trying to cut a

wet T-shirt. It's a mat of millions of tiny roots that grow with the sewage and appears to have lined the flow line of the pipe. In most cases this type of root system will accumulate tons of black sludge. When you put the camera down the drain you may run into a soft feeling clog that just goes black. This is a good sign that these are the type of root intrusion you're dealing with. If you see this it may be beneficial to just go straight to a dig up. If you can see the roots however, you can begin trying to punch a hole in them and go from there.

THE CUTTING PROCESS

Depending on what equipment you have at your disposal, there are two different ways of attacking roots. Regardless of the equipment you have, the first step is to punch a hole in the roots so that the drain will take water. Once you get the drain to take water you can work effectively without having massive quantities of water backing up into the house.

If you only have access to a traditional rod machine, make sure you have a variety of tips that work to cut roots. There are many great options across the manufacturer spectrum. My go-to machine for roots at our shop is the RIDGID K-1500 with the root cutter tip, but there are many options across all platforms.

The tough part about using a traditional drain machine is that you must completely remove the camera before you start rodding, so you don't damage the camera reel. If you are using this option, make sure you set the camera distance counter to zero while entering the drain. When you get to the roots make a note of how far out into the system they are. Say, for example, the roots are 30 feet from your access point. When you put your drain cables in run them to just shy of 30 feet. Run the machine into the line a few inches until you feel the tip catch the roots. Tear the roots a few inches at a time running the machine in forward for a few minutes, and then backward for a few minutes and then continue in a few more inches. Follow this process in and out until it starts to feel easier and you think you've done the job. Make sure you run water in a nearby sink while you are cutting roots to help wash the roots that you've cut down the drain.

If you have a powerful jetter, this process becomes much easier. After you punch through

the roots and get water flowing, switch tips to whatever root-cutting tip you use. Push the tip in beyond the point of roots and follow that up by putting your sewer camera in behind it until you can see the roots. Now pull the root-cutting tip back until you can see it is in the correct position to eat roots. Pull the camera back far enough where it will be unaffected by the cutting tip and cut roots. Turn the water off and push the camera downstream and see your progress as needed.

If you have both traditional cable machines and a jetter you could use both on the same line as needed depending on how things are going. Grip and rip with the cables and cut things back with the jetter. **c**

DO EMPLOYEES DESERVE PRAISE JUST FOR DOING THEIR JOB?

Giving sincere, positive feedback to your workers is beneficial for retention and your bottom line // By Liz Uram

O YOU EVER FEEL LIKE THERE IS WAY TOO MUCH appreciation shown in your workplace? If you said no, you're not alone. Your team would probably say the same thing.

A Gallup survey revealed that 65% of employees haven't received recognition in the last year. This directly correlates to the studies that consistently report that two-thirds of American workers are disengaged.

Employees who don't receive recognition are 51% more likely to look for another job; are less motivated to produce more and better work; and they are less likely to respect you as a leader.

WHAT GETS REWARDED GETS REPEATED. IF YOU WANT THEM TO KEEP DOING THEIR JOB, LET THEM KNOW THAT THEIR WORK IS APPRECIATED.

It's easy to see that one of the most important communication skills in a leader's skill kit is the ability to give positive feedback. This is also one of the most underdeveloped skills for many leaders. The reason is that some leaders just don't know where to start.

Here are the five most common questions leaders have about giving praise:

Why should I praise someone for just doing his or her job?

Two words: positive reinforcement. Do you want them to keep doing their job? Keep this phrase in mind: What gets rewarded gets repeated. If you want them to keep doing their job, let them know that their work is appreciated.

One study concluded that 81% of employees would produce better work more often if they received personal recognition for their efforts.

That seems like a good return on investment for a few sincere words of appreciation.

I don't need praise; why do they?

Who knows? Everyone has different internal drives that determine what motivates them. Recognition is one of the top motivators along with challenging work, growth opportunities, job security, being part of a team, and compensation.

If you happen to be motivated by growth opportunities you may not understand why someone needs a pat on the back. You might even think they are being needy. Beware. That kind of thinking is a barrier to your own growth and could hold you back from achieving your goals.

The best leaders understand that everyone is different and they meet people where they're at without judgement.

How do I give praise without sounding phony?

The secret to meaningful recognition is to make it sincere, specific and timely.

- Sincere. This part is easy. If you are specific and timely and you are genuine with your praise you will automatically come across as sincere.
- Specific. Instead of a generic "Good job!" try saying, "Thanks for taking the initiative to help John get that project finished. I really appreciate your teamwork." The person is more likely to repeat the behavior when they know what the praise is for.
- Timely. Say it as close to the event as possible. If you wait it loses its impact. Follow this rule for keeping your praise timely: when you see it, say it.

Should I praise in public or in private?

You should give your praise where the employee is most comfortable. However, many leaders are hesitant to give recognition in public. They worry that it will create jealousy or resentment. Forget those fears.

One benefit of praising in public is that it shows the lower performers what's possible. It can actually be the shot in the arm they need to step up. Looking for opportunities to give shoutouts for positive behaviors, both big and small, in public creates a culture of appreciation.

You might even notice team members praising each other which will result in increased morale and trust. One study showed that 90% of direct reports agree that team spirit is increased when the leader provides appreciation and support.

How often should I offer praise?

We know that once-a-year praise is not enough, but many leaders don't know how often they should acknowledge good work. This is a good question because praising too often can be as bad as not praising often enough. Running around giving high-fives, thumbs up and generic "thanks" is exhausting for you and uninspiring to your team.

A good rule of thumb is to provide positive praise to each person on your team once a week. You may be thinking, "some people aren't doing anything worth praising on a weekly basis." Look harder.

Did your chronically tardy employee show up to the meeting on time? Let them know you appreciate that.

What about the people who come in day after day and do their job? Nothing more, nothing less. They get the job done and you need them. Let them know you appreciate being able to count on them.

The benefits of appreciation are clear: increased retention, motivated team members who work hard, and respect for you as a leader. Start catching people in the act of doing things right. 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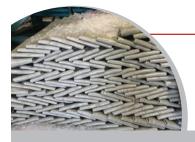
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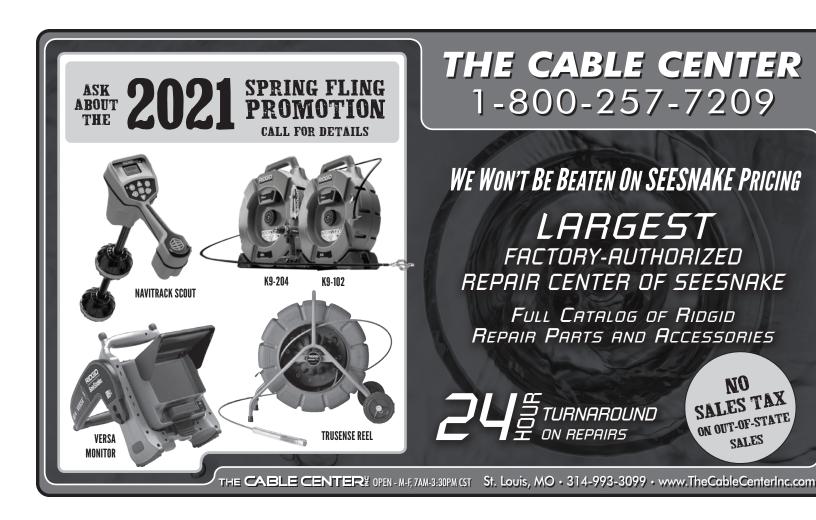
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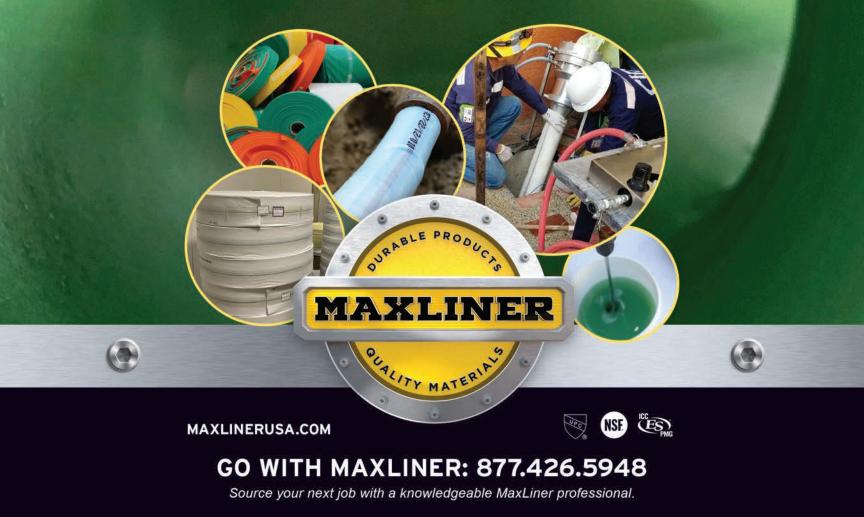

A QUICK NEW COAT

PipeCaster Pro pipe coating system rehabilitates pipes where lining is difficult — and without reinstatements // By Ken Wysocky

INING VERTICAL RUNS OF PIPES INSIDE BUILDINGS,

particularly high-rise structures, is often problematic due to access issues with bulky pipe lining equipment. And then there's the matter of reinstating all those branchlines, a laborious and time-consuming task.

But Tom Hlavac, the co-owner of California-based Select Trenchless Pipelines, sidesteps both of those issues with a PipeCaster Pro pipe coating system built by IPP Solutions. The investment has opened up a lucrative new market for the company, located in Riverside — about 55 miles east of downtown Los Angeles.

"There's no question this machine has given us access to customers we couldn't serve before, especially high-rise buildings," says Hlavac, who co-owns the business with his son, Tom Hlavac Jr. "It allows us to fix customers' problems without tearing out walls or ripping up concrete-slab floors.

"It makes life good for them and good for me, because the cost of pipe coating relative to opening up walls and floors is so much lower, but still profitable. It's a win-win for clients and contractors. And not having to do reinstatements is absolutely a time-saver."

The company, which Hlavac established in 2002 and employs 18 people, enjoys a broad customer base that includes residential, commercial, industrial and municipal clients. The most popular application for the technology is rehabbing leaking cast iron pipes.

With a price tag of around \$35,000, which Hlavac says includes all the "bells and whistles," the machine represents a considerable upfront investment. But the return on that investment has been substantial, he says.

"It definitely paid for itself. And it did so quickly, too."

READY, SET, SPRAY

Hlavac says operating the system is relatively easy, as long as operators get proper training, which IPP Solutions provides. He says that a competent technician should feel comfortable running the machine after two to three jobs.

The system sprays — not brushes — a two-part polyurea resin onto a pipe's interior. (It also can dispense polyurethane and epoxy products.) The resulting coating is seamless, flexible and strong.

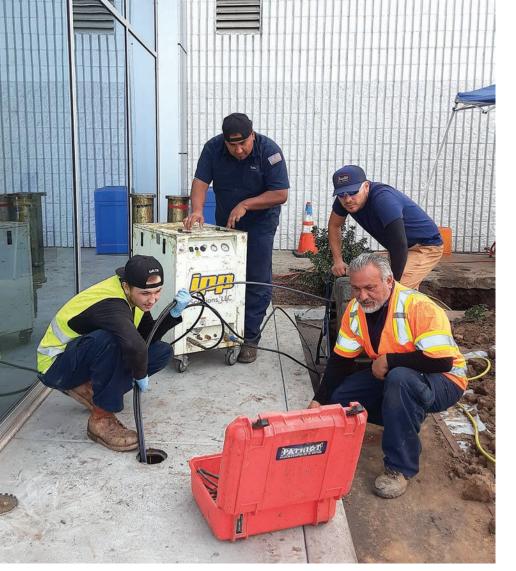
As with many pipeline rehab technologies, a clean host pipe is essential to a successful end product. Most of the pipe rehab projects Select Trenchless performs involve rusted-out cast iron pipes, so the first step is descaling those pipes.

"We do a very careful and controlled cleaning in order to preserve as much of the cast iron pipe as possible," he explains.

To do that, Hlavac's crews first use pipeline inspection cameras made by RIDGID and General Pipe Cleaners. Then they deploy drain machines such as Mini and Maxi Millers from Picote Solutions or a Little Wizard from GI Industries, along with chainknockers made by Picote, GI Industries and Renssi Finland Oy.

The last step is a thorough cleaning with a dolly-mounted Patriot 1776 water jetter made by Patriot Sewer Equipment.

the coating without spinning the sprayer head. "So the resin just squeezed out like toothpaste and filled in the rotted-out channel," he says.

SEEING IS BELIEVING

It's not unusual for customers to be skeptical about the pipe coating technology. To boost their confidence, Hlavac shows them a section of commercially available, precoated cast iron pipe, available at most home centers.

"When people see that cast iron pipes actually are made with a coating, it gives the coating process credibility," he says.

Investing in the PipeCaster Pro reflects Hlavac's overall philosophy of staying at the forefront of technology in order to best serve customers.

"When new, cutting-edge technology comes along, it's incumbent on us as plumbing professionals to know what's out there so we can present it as a solution for our clients. You've got to keep up with the times."

Hlavac also says it's important to thoroughly vet new products to be sure they provide great solutions for customers. If he doesn't believe in a certain technology, he refuses to offer it to clients.

Educating customers also is an important part of the sales process, particularly for newer technology like pipe coating, he adds.

"After I educate customers about the process and show them a sample of a coated pipe, I get approvals pretty quickly. It's a nobrainer option that sells itself — and then some." **c**

"You absolutely have to flush and clean the pipe with a water jetter to remove any oils from the pipes," he explains. "Otherwise the coating won't adhere properly."

The last step is the actual coating process. An operator pours the two polyurea resin components into the unit, which mixes them at the correct proportions. Then a spinning sprayer mechanism attached to a neoprene hose gets fed all the way to the end of the host pipe. The actual coating process occurs as the hose is manually pulled back toward the operator.

"We slide a camera down the pipe after the sprayer is inserted, and pull it back along with the sprayer, so we can see how the coating is being applied," Hlavac says. "Spraying on the coating is better than brushing it on because it gives you an even, consistent coat."

The unit applies a coat that's about 1/16-inch thick and cures in about 90 seconds. After that, more coats can be applied as needed.

"But two or three passes usually does the trick," he says. "We can usually do about 5 feet per minute."

The process requires two technicians, one to handle the camera and the other to apply the coating.

In one job, where the bottom of a 4-inch-diameter, 60-foot long cast iron pipe was completely rotted out, a technician applied

AS A 19-YEAR-OLD, DANIEL FANTI VENTURED NORTH

from Orange County to San Jose, California, and went to work for an older brother as a plumber's helper. He labored with the older sibling for about a month before returning south to Fullerton "looking for an opportunity," and he found one.

Fanti was hired as an apprentice plumber and subsequently

honed his plumbing and drain clearing skills for the next seven years. He only switched jobs after a friend referred him to another company. There, he found a mentor, Mitch Clemmons. "Mitch is very nice guy. He saw I had the drive to start a company. He *pushed* me to start a company. He allowed me to continue to work for him while I pursued a license."

Fast-forward a couple years to January 2019 and the newly licensed Fanti became the owner and sole employee of Jetters 'N' Drains Plumbing.

DIAGNOSING DRAINS

Fullerton is a city of 140,000 people on a valley floor among the Coyote Hills of northern Orange County, some 25 miles south of Los Angeles. It is a suburban region with a fading citrus grove history and lots of housing tracts and commercial centers now filling the flats. Because the suburbanization began soon after World War II, much of the housing stock and the mains serving it are 50 or more years old. Cast iron and vitrified clay pipes dominate.

Given the area's Mediterranean-like climate, the network of commercial and residential drains and pipes is not deeply buried and is easily accessed for cleaning. Fanti loves to clean them.



"For me, it starts with the fact that I love drains," he says. "There is a great feeling that comes from clearing a plugged drain, from hearing the sound of water running freely and then putting a camera in to show a homeowner what's going on down there. It's sort of like a doctor showing patients what's going on."

His passion for the work grew quickly after he did a lot of drain clearing for the company where he previously worked. Today, he is building out his business in both commercial and residential sectors using a variety of tools, chief among them a Gorlitz GO-4000 jetter.

He calls on the jetter to perform thorough clearing of drain obstructions and restoration of a pipe's interior. "I tell people there is a big difference between clearing a pipe and cleaning a

pipe. I use a snake to clear a drain and a jetter to clean it. When people ask if I can clean out a blockage, I say, well, I can either unclog it or clean it. I can unclog it with a cable but if you want it clean, I'll use a jetter."

The GO-4000 is a Honda-powered portable jetter that produces 3,500 psi and pushes out 10 gpm. It has a hydro-pulse feature to break through stubborn obstacles in a pipe. Fanti's machine also has a modified buffer tank installed by EPL Solutions.

PROVIDING OPTIONS

Jetters 'N' Drains is known in the area, according to Fanti, for its "\$99 drain clearing special." He will bring his equipment to a home or business, clear any drain from the clean-out access point and warranty the work

for 30 days. Lines from clean-outs normally run no farther than 100 feet.

"I always give my customers options," he says. "If it's in their budget to clean it with a jetter, fine. But I can get it open for \$99 and run a camera to see if there is something going on with the pipe."

To clear an obstruction, the company can call upon a trio of RIDGID Flex-Shaft machines — the K9-102 and K9-204 models for smaller diameter lines and the K9-306

Fanti acquired the three cable machines through a RIDGID Instagram giveaway contest after submitting a winning video of one of his jobs.

"They sent me the three machines and that took my business to the next level," he says. "The machines made the jobs so much easier." He also has a Gorlitz GO-62 for larger lines and a Milwaukee hand snake for blockages in narrower diameter pipes.

To locate the pipe problems, or perform post-cleaning inspections, Fanti relies on a RIDGID SeeSnake standard model camera with a 220-foot reel and a CS12x monitor. It gets a workout regularly when local properties change hands. Jetters 'N' Drains is on the speed dial of several local realtors for inspection work.

"I work with a lot of them," he says, "helping protect a real estate client's investment. You buy a \$500,000 home, you want to make sure the pipes are clean. I give the realtors a special package, a discount rate when a property is in escrow. I walk it through with them and explain everything I found."

The quality of the inspection work has regularly led to new business from customer recommendations. "Most of them refer me to other people. Believe it or not, 75% of my business is through referral and word of mouth. The way I look at it, as long as you take care of your client, your phone always is going to ring."

He advertises primarily online through Yelp and Google, partly

LOOKING TO BUILD

Whenever "normal" business returns, drains will continue to be Fanti's forte. He loves the work and is good at it. Jetters 'N' Drains does offer traditional plumbing services like fixing leaks. It also offers underground line locating services using a RIDGID

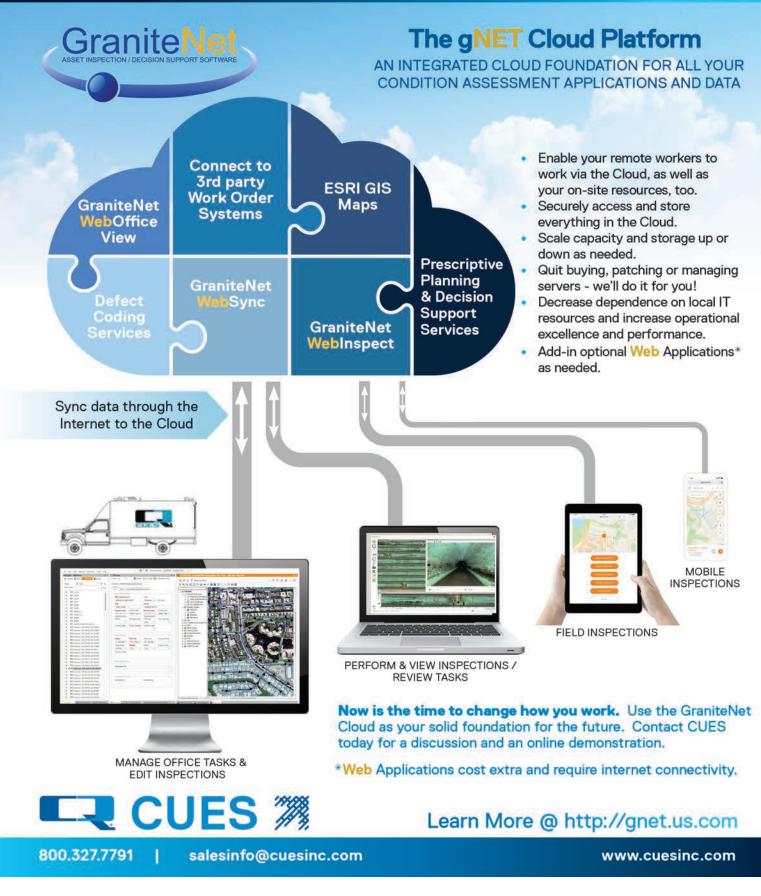
because of public nervousness associated with COVID-19. "People want to see stuff on their phones rather than touch door hangers and other kinds of advertising. Once things get back to normal, I'll probably do newspaper advertising and billboards."

Only in business for a year before the virus began to skew the marketplace with lockdowns, Fanti isn't entirely certain what "normal" is. "The first month of the pandemic, things got a little difficult. Everyone was cautious about letting service techs of any kind into their homes. When I did hear from customers, I got some pretty strange calls about removing paper towels and rags from pipelines.

on't be afraid to take the plunge as a new businessperson. That's the advice of Daniel Fanti, the owner of Jetters 'N' Drains, a one-man southern California plumbing company working its way through the pandemic in only its second year of business.

Fanti says the decision to open his own plumbing company in 2019 was pretty simple. "I've always wanted to go into business for myself. I like to help people and I love drain work. So, I said, why not? Nothing to lose."

He firmly believes that one should commit to the act of starting a business once a person has dreamed it and laid the groundwork.

"You want to try different things, different methods of running a business, because certain things won't work for certain people. See what works best for you," Fanti advises anyone thinking about going out on his own. "The main thing is, start now. Why wait till later? Plenty of people reach a point of wanting to start a business but hesitate for many reasons. I would say, don't wait till later. Start now because it's going to take time to build a business.

"It's like those who say, I want to be all ready before I have kids. Well, you are never really going to be ready to start a business and you can learn from your experiences. Go ahead. It's going to be fun and, long term, it's worth it."

The main consideration, he adds, is to start a business with customers in mind.

"If you are in a job that provides a service, you have to be in business for the right reason. You have to be there to serve. That's my job. I'm in the plumbing business and am reliant upon people calling me. If you do the right thing, you always are going to have work. And the best form of advertising is word of mouth because I know when someone is referred to me, that person already trusts the person who did the referring."

But drains are the company's primary focus and that focus will become even more concentrated moving forward. "If you look in my van, there really is nothing much there but drain clearing equipment."

Descaling pipe will remain a staple service, too, he says. Fanti frequently is called to descale pipe

running under houses built on slabs. "If I can descale 50-year-old cast iron pipe and bring it back to a state where it is round and clean and

then coat it, I've bought it another 50 years of life — reconditioned and restored it without ripping up the home." The K9-306 and a Picone Solutions Mini Miller are his tools for that cleaning work. Quik-Coating polyurea resin from Pipe Lining Supply is applied to protect the cleaned pipe.

Looking beyond the pandemic, Fanti is confident about the long-term prospect for his business. "When we get back to something somewhat normal, I'll be fine. I'm looking for growth."

Growing the company will mean hiring someone to share the workload and getting more trucks on the road. In 2021, he wants to bring pipe bursting and pipe lining jobs in-house — such jobs presently are subbed out. Most important, he plans to grow his company in a way that reflects his own values.

"I want to start building my team by making sure it is a company where I would want to work, where I would be happy working," he says. "I want employees who are happy to come to work. That's where I am right now. It's all going to start with the work environment. Customers come first, but your team needs to be happy to do that." **c**

CHEMICAL AND MECHANICAL ROOT CONTROL

ROOT PROBLEM ELIMINATED ON LAKESIDE EASEMENT



PROBLEM / A neighborhood in Liberty, Missouri, had a heavily root-bound easement. Access was difficult, as the 1,280-foot line traveled across the backyards of houses situated on a lake. The line was laid unevenly, which gave roots more opportunity to invade. There were continual blockages, with several houses experiencing backups. The municipality put the easement on a saw, cut and flush routine program, conducted twice a year. However, they were called out for emergencies in between the maintenance visits as well, as there were constant problems.

SOLUTION / Duke's Root Control applied RazorRooter II to the entire easement. The hose released and sprayed the foam in all directions, allowing it to adhere to roots and penetrate through wye connections to kill roots, without harming trees or other aboveground vegetation.

RESULT / "A few months after the foam was applied in January, we ran our CCTV through the pipe, and the roots had decayed, like you see cigarette ashes crumble," says Gary Harter, operations manager for the city of Liberty. "Our camera made it right through the pipe. We haven't had any blockages since. This has saved our city a tremendous amount on time lost wages and expenses. 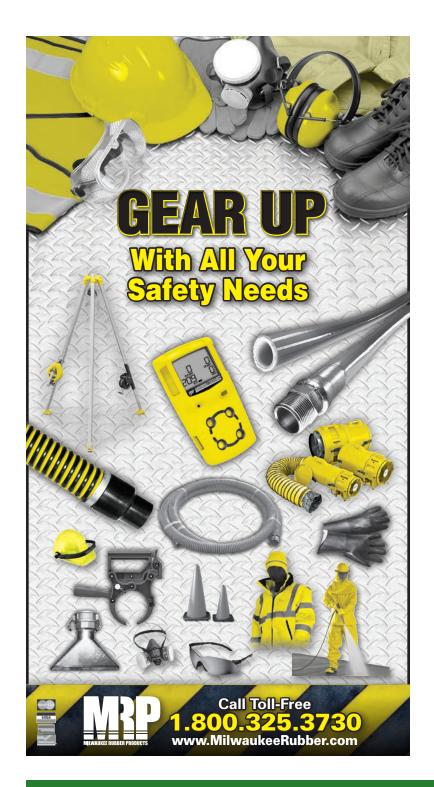
TOWN FINDS EASY SOLUTION FOR ROOT INTRUSION ISSUES



PROBLEM / The town of Brandon, Vermont, dealt with continuing root intrusion issues in an 8-inch gravity sewer that originated on Pearl Street, and runs along Maple Street. The route has a couple of Crimson King maple trees that the town considers aesthetically valuable, but have large and far-reaching root structures belowground.

SOLUTION / RootX was deposited in the manhole at the end of the line on Pearl Street along with about 20 gallons of water. "We treat the line without having to spend about half an hour with the rodding machine and/or 15 minutes with the flusher machine dragged behind the truck," says Stive Cijka, town of Brandon chief operator. "We have 12 river crossings and many are not in a spot to drive a truck up to with a flushing machine, but we can always carry a 40-pound box of RootX to the manhole to treat the line where our machinery cannot reach."

RESULT / "There are only two of us on the crew to maintain six pump stations, 22 miles of sewer line, and a 700,000-gpd design extended aeration wastewater plant," Cijka says. "Being I am 61 and my assistant is 55, we strive to work smarter not harder. The town manager has allowed us to buy a small pallet of RootX at a time to treat a substantial area, so in approximately 4.5 years we would have treated the whole system once." **800-844-4974**; www.rootx.com **c**

PRODUCT SPOTLIGHT INSPECT PIPELINES ON A BUDGET

Sewer line cleaning and inspection were once distinctly separate industries. However, that line is getting blurred as inspection camera equipment becomes more affordable and compact. Southland Tool, a longtime provider of sewer cleaning tools and accessories, has now entered the inspection market with the affordable ST-PRO CAM jet camera nozzle.

"It's designed to give every jet user the ability to inspect and record the conditions of the sewer line, ensuring accurate repairs the first time for a very reasonable price," says Southland Tool President David Pryor. "We integrate our self-leveling camera head with GoPro technology, along with 6- to 8-inch adjustable skids, three high-quality LED lights and a rear thrust nozzle, all for an affordable price point aimed at contractors being able to put one on every truck."

The unit can be ordered compatible with 1/2-, 3/4- or 1-inch hose. If inspection of larger lines is required, a set of adjustable wheeled skids is available for inspecting either 10- to 12-inch or 15- to 18-inch lines. 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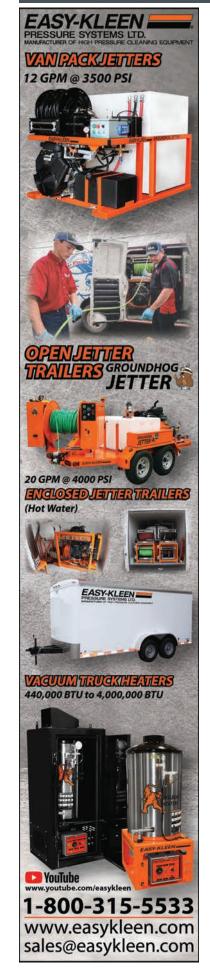
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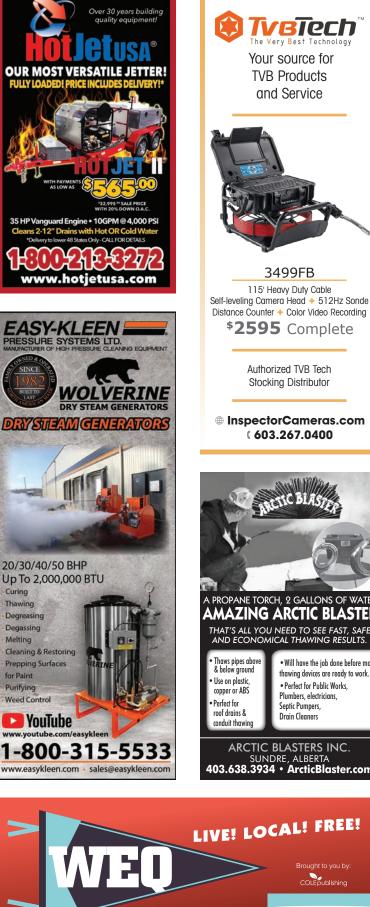

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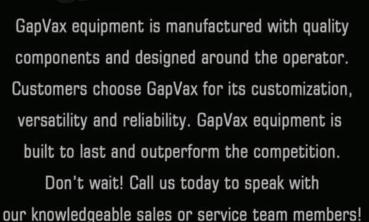
